#### E-code Determination:

Sport explanation: There has been increased interest in looking at sports-related traumatic brain injuries. BSCIP categories some sports-related injuries, but by the etiology it is hard to determine the exact mechanism of the injury. Also, sports are not well captured using ICD-9-CM codes. Sports-related injuries would probably mostly fall in a combination of the "Fall" category and the "Struck by/against" category. For the purposes of this report they are either considered "Sports-Related" or "Other".

Motor vehicle traffic explanation: MV traffic incidents are those that involve and motor vehicle and happen on a public roadway. If a motor vehicle (car, truck, etc) hits or is hit by something else (pedestrian, bicyclist, etc) on a public roadway, it's a MV traffic incident. If a motor vehicle is not involved or if a motor vehicle is involved but it doesn't happen on a public roadway, then it's not considered MV traffic.

Other: This category includes the following topics: pedestrian other, transport other, pedal cyclist other, medical complications, other






